'Preceptorship is a period of structured transition for the newly registered practitioner during which he or she will be supported by a preceptor, to develop their confidence as an autonomous professional, refine skills, values and behaviours and to continue on their journey of life-long learning.'

The preceptorship programme can also support nurses transitioning from working in secondary care, the independent sector, or nurses new to the NHS and primary care.
